Shades of Gold

Did you ever wonder where the golden retriever originated? Did you ever ponder—did the first golden come from England or from Ireland? Or did these wonderful dogs simply drop down from heaven?

Golden retrievers were established in 1868 and were first bred by Lord Tweedmouth at Guisahan Estate in Scotland. The first litter of 3 puppies were named Cowslip, Primrose and Crocus; they were sired by a yellow wavy-coated retriever named Nous and by Belle, a Tweed water spaniel. The beginning of our beloved breed is thanks to Nous and Belle. All golden retrievers are descended from this original twosome. The colors vary, from dark golden to almost white.

The dark gold-colored retrievers are generally smaller-framed dogs. They have more energy and are driven, with strong hunting and retrieving instincts. These dogs are considered field goldens. What is considered the American golden retriever range from light gold to a darker color, but most tend to be a golden color.

The American golden retriever is larger than the field golden, but smaller than the English crème.

The English crème or white golden retrievers are usually larger than the AKC standards. They boast big bones, larger blocky heads, and are generally calmer than the field and American golden. The majority of these dogs do not come from England but are bred right here in North America, or they are descended from dogs imported from Scandinavia, New Zealand or Australia.

The golden is a great family pet. Their loyalty, gentleness, and love of being around their people make them one of the most favorite breeds. All golden retrievers have an undercoat, making them double-coated, but coat types vary. Some of these loveable dogs have a curly coat, some have softer hair, some sport a straight topcoat and there are many coat variations in-between. Shaving a golden is not recommended as it ruins their coat, but a nice puppy cut can be advantageous.

Thinking of getting a puppy and wondering what shade that puppy will be when it's all grown up? Just take a look at the tip of the ear. Eventually, that cute puppy will grow into those big paws... and that color.

Whatever your preference, your golden will be a loyal, loving and forgiving member of your family. When you gaze at your golden, with your heart brimming over with love for your four-legged friend, think of Nous and Belle... those two dogs who started it all.

President's Message

Hi,

How times flies. Here it is, fall again. Our reunion picnic was just wonderful—91 adults, 14 kids and 57 dogs. What a sight. The theme this year was Shake, Stay & Roll. Jennifer did a wonderful job planning the decorations and menu to take us all back many, many years. I cannot wait to see what is up her sleeve for 2016. Also, special thanks to others who helped make this event a great success and everyone who attended.

Our numbers are down again this year, but this appears to be a countrywide trend. Led by Adopt a Golden of Atlanta, rescues are working together to save stray goldens from Turkey. This is a win-win situation. We have families in the United States who want to adopt a rescued golden, but don't have the supply of goldens to meet the demand. In Turkey, they have a surplus of stray goldens roaming the forests and streets. We're going to work on solving both problems at the same time.

At the end of October, there will be 18 goldens coming from Turkey. We will get three: Truman (6 years old), Bess (1 year old) and Harry (2 years old). We are working in tandem with Adopt a Golden of Minnesota, who will be getting 15 goldens. (Adopt a Golden of Minnesota is a large rescue covering many states, and they have a long waiting list from people wanting to adopt goldens.)

You may wonder why 18? Is 18 a magic number when it comes to transporting dogs? 18 isn't just random--this is how many dog crates fit on a pallet. The hope is next year in late March or early April, we will be able to bring more. With other rescues joining up, we hope to be able to save two pallets worth of goldens. The Atlanta rescue estimates that by the end of 2015, 175 goldens will have started their new life in America.

Thank you to everyone who has already donated to help cover the expenses of transporting these deserving dogs. However, we haven't reached our goal yet. We are still in need of additional funds and have a Go Fund Me page named "Rescue of Goldens from Turkey(gofundme.com/ju2h2g28), and donations can also be made through our web page. Simply click on the airplane, and you'll find additional information and a way to donate through PayPal.

Thanks to all of you for your support. We couldn't do it without all of you.

to learn new things and is very affectionate. She loves running in the back yard and is a great walker on leash. Car rides are still an issue, but we're working on that.

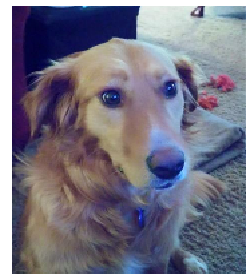
Queenie has come a long way from the shy breeder girl that came to rescue.

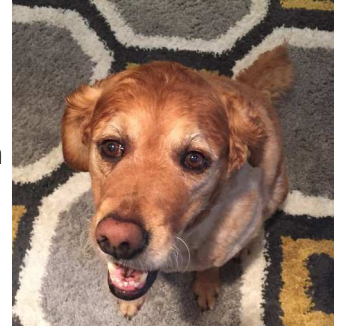
Chief and Levi:

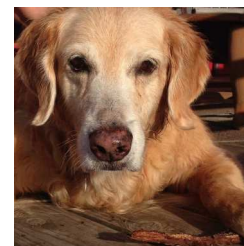

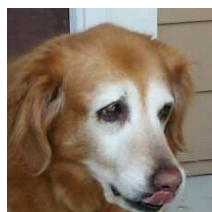

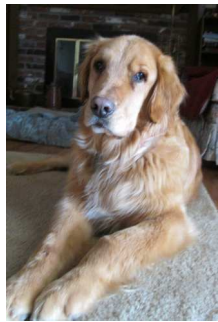

She never found her forever home due to some medical problems, but she was dearly loved in her foster home. We feel so blessed to have been able to have her with us for over a year. In December 2008, we adopted our Sophie from LAGR. She was over 6 years old at that time. She had been a puppy mill momma, very timid and afraid. She was so beautiful and had eyes that displayed her tortured soul. We introduced her to Hannah, her new sister, whom we had adopted from LAGR in June 2006. They immediately bonded. We had to let Isabella go. We had her at the University of Illinois vet clinic in Urbana, and they couldn't determine what caused her lungs to collapse. There was nothing to be done but relieve her pain. We love her so much, it just hurts so horribly. I know you understand. Thank you for all the work you do to take of our loving pets.



Buddy Blue came to rescue at the beginning of March 2015. The family was unable to care for him medically as he had seizures. He went to University of Missouri veterinary school for evaluation. It was determined he had brain damage, so he became a special needs dog. His phenobarbital level was regulated. He started to have seizures at the beginning of April, and Keppra was added to his daily pills. He did great until the beginning of July, and he started to seizure again. As the month went on, his seizures got worse and longer each time. Sadly it was time for him to have peace, and he went to the bridge on July 14th. In the time we fostered him, he made us laugh a lot with his outlook on life. Because he had pills 5 times a day, my cell phone was set to go off to keep him on schedule. Buddy learned the alarm and came to find us to make sure he got his pill on time. He was such a sweet guy who was going to be 4 at the beginning of August. Rest in peace Buddy Blue. We love you.

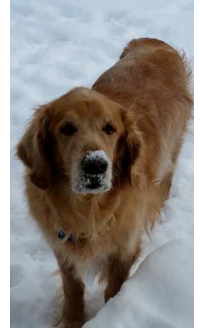
After surgeries for leg fractures under LAGR care, Forest was able to be adopted into our family. She initially was so timid, she would hardly come out of her crate. Chili came to me as a foster dog named Trevor. He and Chad had such fun together that I couldn't let him go. He was my first foster failure. I adopted him on September 16, 2006 (after about one week at my house). I changed his name to Chili Pepper because of his beautiful red coat. Chili was the sweetest dog I've ever had and was such a fun boy. He enjoyed running at the dog park, long walks and sleeping with his head on the pillow next to me. He was a big fan of food, too. He would stand near the kitchen counter and nod his head toward the treat jar to remind me to give him a treat. He loved his babies - the bigger, the better. He carried them everywhere and rested his head on one when he slept. In August 2014, Chili broke his leg running in the yard with Chad and was diagnosed with Osteosarcoma. We decided to remove his leg, and he was given 3-5 months. He made it 10½! Losing his leg didn't slow him down for a minute. He could still go for walks, visit our neighbors and go for rides. He always had such a zest for life. I tell everyone he taught me to live life to the fullest. Chili's cancer spread to his lungs, and we had to let him go on June 30. I still miss him terribly, but he will always be in my heart.



Foley came to LAGR seven years ago. He was found running the fields in Foley, Missouri. For the next seven years of his life, he was obsessed with balls... or anything slightly round. (He even tried to gnaw the tennis balls off a walker at a local nursing home.) For a golden, he was quite aloof, but also quite stoic. (At the vet, he once had a toe nail yanked out--without any pain killer--and didn't even yelp or whimper.) Scared of thunder storms, he'd invariably end up in the bathroom and would sit in the tub--like he was the captain of his ship.

He was loved by all of us (even though he never learned to love Codee, he just tolerated him). He lived with us for three years, and we were always amazed how he could find what he wanted. He would find Champ to lie beside or Ozzie to walk over. If he or Codee got too close, he would growl (which is the only time he ever did). He could find the water dish whenever he decided he wanted a drink. Our friends were always amazed to see him walk in and out the front door and down the couple of steps with no problem. He loved to go for short walks until last spring. His legs were starting to give out, and he developed "Old Dog Vestibular.". Our vet was afraid that he would not live through this disease, but he made a complete recovery and was back to doing the things that he liked to do. He was just weaker. The last week of his life, he started having neurological issues and could no longer stand. On September 24th, he went to the bridge with Mom and Dad at his side and all of his brothers and sister (yes, even Codee) telling him goodbye. We loved you and miss you Finn. Rest in peace dear little buddy.
