To do this successfully, we need funds as well as the work the volunteers do, along with all of the work from our wonderful foster homes.

Love a Golden Rescue is very lucky to have loyal donors who respond to our annual Valentine Appeal each February. Thank you! Each year, we hold a Missouri and an Illinois Trivia Night which are always fun. At holiday times, we gift wrap at four local Barnes and Noble stores. Each year, we try to have a special fund raiser. In May of 2011, we were approached by Adam Williams of Wishbone Photography. He asked if we had any need of his volunteer help as a photographer. Several of us brain stormed, and our imaginations ran wild. Could we really put a calendar together? We knew the Golden Retriever National Specialty was to be held in September 2012 in St. Louis, so the timing was perfect. This would be a great venue to sell the calendars. We figured we had to "strike while the iron was hot."

We talked to Adam about the logistics of producing a calendar. He was very anxious to help us make our calendar a reality. As we researched, we found printing our calendar would be a very big hurdle due to the expense. To make this dream come true, we needed to raise funds.

The calendar committee met with Adam to do additional problem-solving, and it was decided to take bids for each month's page, as well as challenging people to bid BIG for the front cover. This proved to be very successful, and we raised enough money to cover the printing.

Adam met with the "stars" of our calendar for the photo shoots for each of the months from September through June. In January, we waited patiently for snow, so we could hopefully get some great snowy pictures. It was a warm winter with no significant snow, so this did not happen. Most of the photos were taken at Castlewood State Park or Queeny Park in St. Louis County. These two sites provided some beautiful backdrops for our gorgeous Golden Retrievers. In order to get the best light, the photo call time was early, mostly at 7:30 in the morning. Luke's session (Luke is on the front page) took a while. After hiking to overlook the valley, he kept his tail between his legs. However, Adam has an endless supply of patience, and finally, he was able to take the beautiful photo that's emblazoned across the front cover of our calendar.



President's Message

Hi

Did you ever think about how unpredictable life is? For us humans, we hopefully can roll with the punches but what about the dogs we rescue? I wonder what they think is happening to them when their life changes so quickly?

Take a puppy mill dog for instance. First, they have to endure the transportation in a contraption (a car). They have no idea what it is, and then it moves--how frightening that must be for them. Then they arrive at a vet's office and are handled by people--another scary thing, as they have never been handled before. This is just the beginning of their journey. Once in a foster home, there are so many noises they have never heard, so many things to learn, but luckily, there are dedicated people to help them.

Many of these dogs recover and become wonderful pets but some, such as Bella, who we adopted a couple of years ago, has never recovered. Bella will still not come into the house unless we hide; her fear of the threshold is so great. She has been in rescue for five years, and we cannot imagine what happened to her to carry this much baggage for so long.

Some dogs are in loving homes, but due to circumstances beyond their owners' control, they must come to rescue. The dogs' lives are turned upside down. They are turned over to strange people and go to a vet they do not know. With these dogs, they tend to recover quickly in their foster homes. When they go to wonderful homes, they adjust very well.

Some dogs are strays which have come from shelters. Their time in the shelter is very stressful. When the "stray hold" time is up, they can go to rescue. These are the dogs we know little about and have to learn what makes them tick. Foster homes are very important when it comes to evaluating stray dogs.

Huey was a stray who was dumped. He was well-loved and well cared for the first part of his life, but then he was given to "friends" who promised to take care of him when his first owner experienced a job loss. At some point in his life, something happened to him that made him skittish. He's terrified of thresholds and is extremely hesitant when approaching people. When the "friends" moved, they didn't take Huey with them. They simply dumped him and left him to fend for himself. A part of Huey remembers what love is. He adores being petted, but there is a part of his heart which is scarred.

During the last few months, I have thought a lot about life, especially about the dogs we rescue. How thankful I am for our foster homes. They take these dogs into their homes and work with them so that the loving families that want to adopt from us can continue to love them and give them wonderful forever homes.

Goldens are a very resilient breed and often do not look back. We have all watched as one of our fosters gets adopted. They climb in the car with their new family and never look back, while we stand there crying because we put our heart and soul into the dog making it whole again. Then we think about the next one and start all over again.

I am so proud to be part of Love a Golden Rescue. During the last 11 years, I have met many wonderful people and formed life-changing friendships.

ASK ELSA



For this issue, I have decided that I need to tackle what I feel is a growing problem. Recently I visited my Golden cousins--Governor and Chloe—who are two older Golden. My, have they grown, but they haven't grown taller...just wider. Governor is a big-framed boy and topped the scale at 110 pounds. Chloe was 93 pounds. She is no longer active due to her aches and pains in her old bones. I am pleased to report that they both have lost a significant amount of weight, thanks to their parents who followed the vet's instructions. They were fed Purina OM Overweight Management food and are now slimmer and trimmer.

I started to look around me. My goodness! Some Golden no longer have waists. Those of you who know me may wonder how I can be so critical. You might say, "Elsa, it's easy for you to talk. You never have a problem with a little extra weight." After all, I am a petite 52 pound girl (some of my pranks and troublemaking burns off calories, but don't tell my parents that).

I have seen weight problems with foster dogs in our home. Mae was a walking coffee table at 130 pounds, but now she is sleek at 64 pounds. The scale used to groan when Maggie Moo stepped on it. She was 117 pounds, but now she is 68 pounds, if you can believe that. I would like to share eleven things for you to tell your parents, especially if you feel you no longer have a waistline.

1. An overweight (especially obese) Golden can lose 2 years from their life due to the extra weight. I know I want to be around as long as possible.
2. Table food is a big no-no. This will pack on the pounds. A moment on the lips and down the gullet means a lifetime on the hips.
3. If you are given lots of treats, especially large ones, then this should be taken into account with the amount of food you receive each day. Ask for tiny treats—they taste just as good.
4. Beg your family to go "vegan" when it comes to treats. A cold raw baby carrot tastes like a popsicle to us—it's cold and crunchy and to us, it tastes "sweet." A couple of room temperature green beans right out of your hand would be a tasty treat as well. These are both low calorie and healthy alternatives to more expensive store-bought biscuits.
5. If you are chubby and you do not overeat, or you are plagued by poor coat quality, you may need your thyroid tested. As a side note, both Mae and Maggie Moo now take thyroid meds.
6. Exercise is important. If your owner cannot take you on walks, go out and chase a ball, Get off that couch and have some fun. Daily walks are the best, 20 to 30 minutes of brisk walking every day is ideal. A dog which has played and walked every day is a happy dog.
7. If you are overweight, a good diet food can help. My mom told me overweight rescue dogs are put on OM which works wonders. You can eat a normal amount, and you do not feel starved or deprived.
8. Your food should always be measured. Green beans can be added to your food to help make you feel full without adding calories. (Rinse the canned green beans before you add them to our food. Sometimes there is salt added, and we don't need that extra sodium.)
9. Your vet should give you a "once-over" to be sure there are no health concerns or other health issues going on besides the extra weight problem. The vet can advise your family about the appropriate amount we should be fed every day. (If you ask us, we'd keep saying, "More! More!" just like we keep saying, "More petting! More cuddling! More belly rubs!")
10. Your parents should have the willpower to resist giving in to your begging eyes. We're experts at it. Hey, we're Golden. We're gorgeous, and we're great at getting our way. Give in to our beautiful brown eyes, scratch behind our ears and pat our heads. Tell us what good dogs we are—but don't give us extra treats. We want to be at your side for a very long time.
11. If your family is not sure if you are overweight, have them run their hands down your ribcage. As a rule, they should be able to feel (but not see) your ribs through a thin layer of fat and see a defined "waist" between the ribs and hips.

I hope my tips help you and your family, and I hope you have a long and healthy life.
