

From Turkey to America ... With Love

In early April, seven LAGR volunteers (in two vehicles) drove to Chicago to meet a plane. On the climate-controlled cargo plane were eighteen dogs from Turkey, five coming to LAGR. It was a long trip in one day—the group left early in the morning and didn't get back until late at night, but LAGR volunteers will do anything for our dogs. Our day was made even longer by a delay in customs; after waiting for four hours, we finally got to meet Tom Sawyer, Becky Thatcher, Watson, Sally and Silas. The people anxious to see the dogs had a long wait, but the dogs' wait was even longer—time in their crate before being loaded onto the plane in Istanbul, the plane ride, and then the four-hour wait before being cleared by customs. (At least the volunteers could go down the street to the gas station to go potty.)

When the excited rescue volunteers got the okay, the dogs were released from their crates, got to go potty, were fed and watered and loved on and continued life as if nothing had changed. Their resiliency is amazing. It's as if they saw love and a forever home ahead in their future... and they never looked back.

They are all wonderful dogs and have been adopted to great homes.

Here is the story of Silas, the only non-golden in the group that came in April.

While at a Meet and Greet with Love a Golden Rescue, a message was sent to Jan asking if anyone would be willing to take the "black" golden from Turkey. He was left behind when his pal got picked to come to America. I put up my "paw" and said I would. What was I thinking – a very young, free spirited dog from another country? Silas, as he became known, made the trip from Turkey to Chicago and then the 6-hour drive to St. Louis. We picked him up about 11:30 PM on a Friday night. On Saturday, we were off to the vet for his check-up and any necessary vaccinations. Next stop: grooming and a bath. While the grooming went fairly well, the bath part didn't. We put that off for another day. Poor Silas had been living in a forest and had no idea what these crazy American women were doing to him. Silas settled in quite well. He accepted the resident dog that

was already living in the house and learned to play with his toys. He was a fun, active boy to foster and had so much personality. I loved being a part of his new life.

Now on to his next chapter – his forever home and his forever mom:

Having been involved with Love a Golden Rescue since 2001, we always seem to have dogs come our way that almost speak to us through their photographs. Silas was one of those dogs.

When they said he was coming to the USA, I started asking questions about him. The first pictures I saw of him were taken when he was still in Turkey, and then I saw photos snapped when he arrived in the US and on the road trip back to St. Louis in April. He seemed so loving with other dogs, and I thought he would be a good fit. I spoke with Jan, went through the adoption process and then Silas came home with me.

A short period of time after Silas arrived; I lost my beloved search and rescue dog, Sedona. One can never replace a dog that has left paw prints on your heart, but you can have a new experience with a dog in need. I felt like Sedona was my inspiration to adopt Silas when I saw his determination and play drive. I felt he would be great at search work like Sedona was, and I felt confident Silas would follow our motto, "so others may live".

To America continued

Silas himself:

I am a doggie immigrant from Turkey. I am so thankful to be here in the United States. I'm learning all sorts of new things every day since I have left my homeland. I also stay in touch with some of my friends from Turkey by this neat thing they call Facebook. My mom and I have bonded very well as well as Grandma and Dad falling in love with me. However, I have a job and work for my mom. I am in training for K9 search and rescue, and I love every minute of it from the smelly things to the sometimes smelly things to roll in. The teachers make us find people hiding in boxes or closets, etc. We even take boat trips.

"My body goes where my nose goes" and that is how we locate a missing person. I have come a long way from the Turkish forest at a busy intersection to rural Missouri. I have a job that I am very proud of, and as one of the volunteers appropriately said, "Silas went from being rescued to rescuing others." --Slurps to all from Silas

Note from Love a Golden Rescue:

There are probably more than 3,000 golden retrievers and golden mixes (mixed breed dogs that are predominately golden) in Turkey—in the streets and in the forest. As a small rescue, we are doing our best to help with this situation. We may be small, but we are mighty and fierce when it comes to working on raising funds to save needy dogs like these Turkey dogs. In the United States, approximately thirty-six golden rescue groups are working together to help these dogs, while at the same time making sure no goldens or golden mixes in the USA get overlooked or go unrescued.



A footnote from Jan:

When I saw the video of Silas being picked up from the busy intersection on the edge of the forest, there was another black dog looking on. I could imagine how confused he was... Why was Silas getting rescued, and he was not? He was left behind and looked so mournful, it broke my heart. I sent an email and said to the Turkish rescue workers, "If you can find the black dog again, we will take him." A wonderful and generous supporter of Love a Golden Rescue heard about this and sponsored Karmer. Eventually he was found and spent time at a pet hotel while transportation arrangements were made. In early June, he came to the U.S. with a flight volunteer, flying on a regularly-scheduled passenger flight. Karmer is an adorable boy, probably fourteen months old and is calm and well-behaved. He will make a great pet for someone with another dog. Karmer is a little insecure at the moment; living in a home with people is new to him. He doesn't understand English, but he is learning the ropes quickly.

ASK ELSA

Dear Elsa.

I heard my mom and dad talking about some sweetener that can poison dogs. This sweetener even kills canines. It has a weird name. Whatever it is, it's even deadly to ferrets—not that I have any ferret friends, you understand. Do you know anything about this sweetener with the not-very-sweet results? What about cats? I have one in my neighborhood that I would like to get rid of... Can I feed him some of this poisonous sweetener?

Dear Josh,

I have done some research for you. From all that I've read, if your two legged friends see xylitol as an ingredient, they need to make sure you don't eat any of it. It seems dogs (and yes, ferrets as well) who ingest the sweetener xylitol become poisoned. Serious health problems and even death could result from this additive. Xylitol is a sugar-free sweetener, a kind of sugar alcohol. Xylitol is commonly found in

chewing gum

mints

pudding and gelatin snacks

oral rinses, toothpastes etc.

sugar-free and diabetic candy

some nut butters

some face lotions, prescription medications and nasal sprays

The signs of xylitol poisoning in dogs include weakness, lethargy, collapse, vomiting, tremors, seizures, jaundice and black-tarry stools. As unbelievable as it sounds, even a few pieces of gum can poison a large dog.

I think we should all watch what we eat. These humans seem to eat some funny things. It's okay for them to pop a mint into their mouth or chomp on a piece of gum, but we should stay away from anything that has xylitol as an ingredient. Tell your family to make sure and "X" out anything for us that includes xylitol. (And no, you will have to learn to get along with the neighbor's cat. Cats aren't attracted to sweet things, so they're unlikely to ingest anything with this sweetener.)

Presidents Message

Hi,

I wish to thank all of you for making the 2016 Volunteer Appeal an incredibly successful fundraiser. The donations we receive help us maintain our high level of care for our dogs.

So far in 2016, we have taken in 27 dogs. Although this number may not sound very high, many of these dogs had some expensive medical needs. For example, three dogs were heartworm positive, and many needed dental procedures and teeth removed. Holly Madison was found to be pregnant when she went to be spayed. If that wasn't enough for poor Holly, it turned out to be a complicated pregnancy and delivery. It was discovered she had a mass. She had the puppies by c-section, and the plan was to remove the mass that was obstructing the birth canal right after the puppies were born. Unfortunately, the obstruction was in her pelvic cavity and could not safely be removed. Fortunately, four puppies were born and three survived, and all are now in wonderful homes. Holly also has a great new home and is doing well.

Our latest intake Sayda, from southwestern Missouri, is a stray. She recently had puppies which went to a rescue and sadly, she was left behind. She was diagnosed to have mastitis a week after coming to rescue. What a lucky girl to have a health problem and be in rescue, as she was sure to get the needed care. Eight of our intakes are eight-years and older, and they were not well taken care of prior to being rescued.

We also have six dogs from Turkey which are wonderful dogs. Five are already adopted, and Karmer just arrived. We take any dog we hear about but as you can see from the numbers, there just are not very many golden and golden mixes being surrendered. This is the trend countrywide for golden rescues.

We like to think we are a small rescue with a big heart. We are always "making things work." Our biggest need at the moment is foster homes. With our seniors and heartworm positive dogs, it takes time to get them ready to be adopted, and we just need loving foster homes to help accommodate additional dogs. Liberty was a beautiful senior when she was adopted at 11 years old. She went to the bridge 8 months from her adoption date. For those 8 months, she was loved so much. Liberty was so lucky to spend her last months in a wonderful home.

On April 22 2016, my beautiful Sedona (LAGR) crossed the Rainbow Bridge. For part of her life, she was involved in wilderness / urban search and rescue. I not only lost a pet, I lost a "partner." Sedona performed and was certified in wilderness rescue, tracking and trailing as well as HRD. Some of Sedona's favorite moments were when we would be repelling for search, "Twinkle Toes" would just dangle and move her feet without a care in the world. She had my back and would warn me of snakes, and I had her back. A working dog is a very special partner. The bond is extremely tight, and often you do not have to give commands for your dog to know what you are going to do and how they should react and vise versa. No matter if it is a



working dog, tactical, therapy dog, service dog, Urban Search and Rescue or even a medical alert dog, canines understands this special bond and can actually tell often without command from eye contact what you want. Sedona was trained in Polish for her commands, so she was bark-lingual.

My beautiful red girl, you took a piece of my heart with you. I know you crossed the Rainbow Bridge with our precious kitty girl Jill, just days before we saw a beautiful double rainbow the night of your passing.



Huckleberry came to rescue as an owner surrender – he was a farm dog who was a runner. He had the cutest personality and was so very sweet. He loved nothing more than to play fetch, chew on squeaky toys and plays fetch some more. I had lost one of my goldens about a month before I met Huckleberry, so I wasn't thinking about adopting. I fostered him for two months before my 12 year old Chad let Huck eat right next to him. I knew then he was the dog for us, and I adopted him on October 6, 2015. In early April, Huckleberry collapsed and was diagnosed with Hemangiosarcoma. The prognosis was not good, and I lost him three weeks later. I'd like to think Huckleberry had a wonderful 8 months with Chad and me, but I know for sure his last three weeks were the best they could be. Treats, car rides, play dates, new toys and balls

filled his last weeks. I loved this boy so much, and I wish I had gotten to spend more time with him (don't we all though?)

Casey went to the bridge suddenly on June 24th. After he ate his supper last night, I brushed him, and we cuddled and played. Thirty minutes later, he collapsed. We drove an hour to the nearest emergency clinic, but when we got there, he was already gone. He came to live with us in 2010 as a foster, and we adopted him December of 2010. The day I picked him up from the vet's after he had been neutered was the day I fell in love with him. Casey had the sweetest face, and he was such a happy dog. When I got him home, he was crazy, wanting to hump anything that would stand still. Rocky, my other male golden, couldn't get within a foot of Casey without being jumped. A friend gave Casey a giant pink pig, and it became Casey's favorite toy(?). Casey's nickname, at that time, became the pig humper! Luckily, that phase didn't last very long. Casey became Rocky's best friend, and then later, he was Allie Rose's best friend, our Tater Tot that we adopted in 2014. Whenever we came home, he would come out the doggie door with a toy in his mouth to show us, and he was so happy to see us. We will miss this amazing dog for a very long time.
