Story of one rescued golden

Things don't always turn out the way you plan. Sometimes vets and medical statistics are wrong. Sometimes first impressions aren't correct. So it was with Elsa...

On April 2, 2006, two 4 $\frac{1}{2}$ lb. puppies came to LAGR from the Missouri/Arkansas border after being abandoned. They were covered with hundreds of ticks. Both puppies were anemic and very sick. We named them Clover and Elsa. They were diagnosed with distemper, and sadly, Clover died the next day, but Elsa was a fighter. She was named Elsa after the lion in the movie "Born Free" and the memoir. Elsa was orphaned as a cub. Our Elsa was very determined to survive, despite having all the cards stacked against her, along with suffering from hair loss, distemper, lacerations, and all the ticks which caused the anemia she battled.



A plan was made and a lot of prayers were said for her to get well. In her foster home, she was given fast-drip IVs twice a day in the back of her neck. The area where the needle went in would swell up with the fluids, and she looked like a miniature camel running around.



Elsa got stronger and survived which was unbelievable. Having had distemper, she had several things going against her. One, her teeth were destroyed due to the distemper viral infection. The enamel was damaged and it was not long before she had just a mouth full of stubs. Secondly, her life expectancy was no more than 2 years, and it was assumed she would almost certainly become a seizure dog. Someone forgot to tell Elsa this, because she lived way past her two-year life expectancy, and she thrived. After nursing her through the critical stages of her illness, her foster home adopted her, figuring her life would be short, but they were committed to making the most of her time.

Surprisingly, she became a therapy dog. Elsa would go to class and in true Elsa form she would sleep until she had to perform a task. When called upon to do something, she was on it and did great. In November 2007, she completed the training and graduated. For many years she went to Mercy Skilled Nursing and enjoyed the interaction with the patients. When she was around ten, Elsa decided it was time to retire. She would not interact with people anymore, so she hung up her harness. She passed the baton to her brother Lincoln in June 2016.

Elsa was known as the naughty girl. She looked innocent and well-behaved. After all, she'd gone through therapy dog training. But looks can be deceiving. Elsa looked like an angel, but she was always plotting something devilish. At events, the adults would be talking in the booth, oblivious to Elsa at the end of the leash. All of a sudden a paper bag would rustle or some cellophane would crinkle, the volunteers would glance around to see what was causing the noise... and they'd see Elsa rooting around a box of treat bags with her nose--she was helping herself to a snack. Her family would have to make sure the door to the basement room was always completely shut--the room where lots of LAGR stuff was stored--because otherwise she'd get into lots of mischief. Volunteers who helped out at events quickly learned that they had to keep an eye on Elsa at all times.

Elsa loved her walks and going to the lake. She hated having new foster dogs come into the house, and she would refuse to interact with them or look at them. Instead, she would turn her back and walk off. Her eating place was in the bathroom, and for most of her life her family could not have toilet paper on the toilet paper holder, because she would pull it off the roll in true Elsa-fashion. She would always bark when she was done eating, and was always impatient if we were not quick enough to let her out. If we were too slow, she would bark again. Just one impatient bark every minute.

Many of you know her as the brain behind the "Ask Elsa" column. Her knowledge was vast, and her writing ability direct. Several months ago she decided she no longer wanted that job and persuaded Keeper to take over.

Elsa dislocated her hip in October 2017, and she had to wear a hobble between her rear legs while she healed and her hip was put back in the socket. After that she was never the same, just like many people after breaking a hip. She no longer wanted to go on walks and had to use a sling for stairs. She did go to water therapy and in true Elsa form decided that was not for her. After a few tries, it was decided she had no aptitude and no longer went.



Elsa got weaker and weaker the last few months. During a visit to VSS it was thought to be neurological more than orthopedic. Sadly, Elsa was lost on May 29th, 2019. She was 13 years old. It is very possible the distemper finally won, due to the neurological symptoms, but in true Elsa form she made sure she had a great time during her life's journey. Rest in peace, Elsa.

Presidents Message

Hi,

I hope you had a great 4th of July and your furry friends did not get too stressed. (Fireworks--and all the other noisy things that happen during that holiday--really can make dogs anxious.) So far this year, our intakes are down. We hear about very few goldens needing to be surrendered, and often when we do get a call or an email, people change their minds or they go elsewhere.

We have not been taking labs--yellow, black or chocolate ones--due to having 5 dogs in heart worm treatment this spring. The treatment is several months long and thus prevents our foster homes from taking in dogs during the treatment. A special thank you to those who are caring for one of these dogs as they recover from the ravages of heart worm.

We have only taken in a handful of dogs from overseas this year. There is a lack of flight volunteers who will bring them to Chicago. Instead, many of the volunteers have been going to either the east or west coast with dogs. Goldens are being saved, just not many in the Midwest.

We do have a senior chocolate lab, Bruce, who is a very sweet dog but is not fond of other dogs, so he has attracted little interest from prospective families. He would love his forever home a place where he can chill out, and soak up the attention. He does not ask for much, just the basics --food, water, love--and a home without a lot of stairs. There has to be a home for this guy... we just have not been able to find it yet. If you know anyone, please let us know.

Luck smiled on us during our 6K run. Thanks to Bob Lynch who modified the course (the course had to be changed due to flooding), we were able to hold a successful run. The people who participated were very understanding when we explained about the flooding. If we had scheduled the run just one week later, where we were was totally underwater.

We are gearing up for our annual Trivia Night on August 17th. Please consider joining us. Get some friends and family together, 8 to a table. The flyer is in this newsletter.

Thank you to our faithful donors, adopters, volunteers and friends. Without the help of each of you, we could not rescue any dogs. Our numbers are down, but each dog we've rescued has had their life changed for the better--forever.

Keepers Korner

I just love spring and summer, but there are dangers in the yard for us doggies, especially in spring. The backyard is the perfect place to sniff around, to play fetch, and spring and summer is the perfect time for play sessions. However, your four-legged friends need to beware of the backyard, because sometimes danger lurks.

Did you ever think those beautiful peonies could make us sick? You humans need to be aware of poisonous plants in our gardens. Puppies especially like to try and eat them. (Puppies are always trying to chew up things, aren't they!)

Some common plants which are toxic are Mums, Irises, Foxglove, Tulip, Daffodil, Azalea, Delphinium, Rhododendron and the list goes on and on. For a more complete list you can search online https://www.1stinflowers.com/articles/poisonous-plants-for-dogs.html One more thing: all bulbs are toxic.

What is the first clue that a four-legger has eaten some backyard plants? Missing flowers. Then--what symptoms should our people look for in case we doggies have ingested something we shouldn't have? Signs that should alarm our owners include vomiting, diarrhea, weakness, change in urine and more-than-usual drooling. If we got hold of a bulb, it's really bad. Look for an upset gastrointestinal system, a stomach pain, and loss of appetite. If you suspect one of your dogs has gobbled up a plant that could endanger their health, call your vet immediately.

I learned a lot while doing my research. Yes, I read in-between play sessions. Even with only three legs, I can still manage to click the keys on the computer keyboard. My favorite books to read, of course, are books like *Lassie* and *A Dog Named Skip*. Well, I need to get back on track. Mum said I'm getting off topic. When I was doing my research, I discovered that deer are maybe smarter than us dogs because they love plants but know to stay away from poisonous ones. Deer do not like strong smelling plants such as Marigolds or plants with fuzzy textures such as Lamb's Ear and they don't like sharp-leafed plants such as Yucca.

I wonder why we did not get that gene? (We got the digging gene instead.)

Help Wanted:




