Dixie's Story

In December of 2019, my family emailed Love a Golden Rescue. I was just a 10-month-old pup back then, and I sat right by their feet as they sent the message.

I heard them say the words "severe hip dysplasia." I didn't know what that meant. All I knew was I was in bad shape. My family loved me a lot, but they couldn't afford the surgeries I would need, so in January, I went to live in a Love a Golden Rescue foster home.

Now we're going to get into a lot of doctor talk, so I'm going to let my foster mom take over for a moment.

"Because of her age, there were two possible surgeries. One, a TPO (triple pelvic osteotomy) is an operation performed on moderate- to large-breed dogs with clinical hip dysplasia (HD). The goals of the procedure are eliminating coxcombical joint laxity, improvement of hip congruity, and getting the stresses of the hip joint into a normal range. The other surgery Dixie could have had was a FHO (femoral head ostectomy). This procedure is nicknamed 'Mother Nature's hip replacement.' It allows dogs to move around, pain-free, even though they have damaged or diseased hips. In the operation, the head and neck of the femur are

removed."

Woof!

"Dixie, you want to jump back in with your story?"

Woof! I know what the femur is, because I've been to so many doctors. The femur is the long leg bone, also known as the thigh bone. Do you see what I mean? All that TPO and HD and FHO stuff gets me confused.

Anyway, I went to two doggie orthopedic specialists. It was decided that I would have a FHO on one hip when I had my first birthday. Then, I would have a second one eight weeks later.

On February 19, I had my first operation. The Love a Golden Rescue volunteers put my story on Facebook, and they got lots of donations to help pay the doctor bills. They were thankful, and so was I. I tried to be as per-

fect of a patient as I could be, because I wanted to grow up to be a dog that could play and run and move around like other dogs. After I got my stitches out (Can you believe it? They sewed me up with a needle and thread!), I got to do something really fun. I got to go to water therapy sessions. I loved it. They put me in a tank with a treadmill, and then they filled the tank with water. I felt like I was in my own personal gym.

Unfortunately, my foster mom and dad found a few black specks close to my front leg and my chest. Then it got worse after my second water therapy. My skin got flaky, and I was covered with specks where the skin had been flaky for a while. The bits of peeled-off skin were all over my blanket, but the water therapy really made them notice it.

No more water therapy for me. I went to the vet. They were really nice to me. The doctors thought it was ichthyosis, which is a very rare skin condition. Dogs get it because of a recessive gene mutation. The mutation stops the outer layer of skin from developing the way it should. Dogs who suffer from this have rough skin, along with thick, greasy flakes that stick to their coat.

The doctors at Heritage recommended I go visit a doggie dermatologist, so my foster family set me up with an appointment, but due to some virus, the appointment got cancelled for several weeks. Finally, I was able to see this special skin doctor for dogs. These doctors were super nice to me, too. The only part I didn't like was the

weird parking lot rules. My foster mom could not go into the clinic with me. A vet tech would come to the car and take me into the clinic. (Sometimes I'd hear my foster mom mutter about "Corona" and "Covid 19," but I don't know what those mean, any more than I know what "coxcombical joint laxity" means.)

Nobody was sure what was wrong with my skin. The docs decided to do a culture. Oh, I almost forgot the biggest news. There was a forever family waiting for me. My new family knew about my skin and hip problems.

When I went to get a culture done, they gave me a medicated dip instead. I was a little nervous because my second hip surgery was two days away. When my foster mom came to pick me up, her mouth opened up wide, and she couldn't shut it.

Apparently, that dip made me look like I had been rolled in grease. Could they operate on a greaseball?

The answer is yes, they could. After the procedure, I blew my coat, and slowly, my gorgeous coat came back, minus the flakes. I had a post-surgery checkup two weeks later and went to water therapy again. This time, no more flaking. I would probably like chips and dip, but this dip was also great, because it seemed to take care of the problem.

June 13 has become a day I'll celebrate. I went to meet my new family on that day and also Merlin, who is my new golden brother. He is a nice dog. He's big (100 pounds), but he's not fat. He's just a gentle giant. I got in the back of their car with Merlin (who made sure he didn't step on me when he changed positions) and got petted by my two-legged sister.

I was shy and kind of nervous when I came to Love a Golden Rescue, but then I got used to my foster home. Merlin used to be shy and insecure too, but now he's the king of his neighborhood. Merlin can show me the ropes and give me lessons on how to be a beloved pet and a normal dog. I bet that when my forever family sends an update, they'll say that I've settled into my new home, and that I'm content and having the time of my life. Merlin told me when he came to Love a Golden Rescue, he weighed 140 lbs., and he now is 100 lbs. and so handsome.



Before I left, my foster mom and dad said this. "We will really miss Dixie, but she needs to start the next chapter of her life. She has been the best foster dog and has endured so much in her short life."

Thank you, first family, for making sure I got into a good rescue. Thank you, Love a Golden Rescue, and thanks to my new family, I'm looking forward to a long and happy life with my forever family.

Keepers Korner

As a tripod, I am a bit uncoordinated and choose to not swim, but I know many of you goldens *do* love to splash around in the pool. Since I feel bad just soaking up the air conditioning while some of my canine friends might be getting rowdy (and injured) in the water, I did some research. Here are some safety tips I came up with:

- 1. Wait a couple of hours after eating to take a dip. (If we go into the water too soon and play hard, we could blow up like an inflatable toy. Bloat would put a damper on any pool party.)
- 2. If it's your first time going into the water, have your people begin with you close to steps (in a pool). Make sure you are facing the stairs. As you get confident, gradually work your way to deeper water. And be sure to not panic when your paws no longer touch the bottom. Let your swimming instincts kick in. (Get that joke? Kick in?) There's a reason why it's called "dog paddle."
- 3. Consider a life vest until you are confident. Don't think of this as being a sissy. Being safe is always the smart way to go. You never know when you might start panicking while learning, and a life vest just gives you a bit of support.
- 4. If you're near a river or sea, never go swimming if there is a strong current. The current could pull you in, and you could drown in the blink of an eye. If it's a lake or pond, and there is algae, stay away, because the algae could be toxic. Also, watch out for slippery areas. Sometimes the bank of a river or the edge of a lake is hard to navigate, causing you to slip, so step carefully and safely—no galloping at top speed into the water.
- 5. Even though you are surrounded by all that water, do not drink it. Ocean and sea water is salty and will dehydrate you. (In severe cases, it can even kill you.) Lake or pond water can be the home for parasites which will give you diarrhea. We goldens have gorgeous coats. We don't want to ruin them by making them messy, do we? Certainly not.
- 6. Once you are finished with your dip, ask your people to rinse you off with fresh water, get your collar taken off and get toweled dry, especially around your neck. Once you're dry, make sure your collar gets put back on you. I'm serious—the summer is hot enough. Getting a hot spot would ruin your summer.
- 7. As goldens, we need our ears dried out after a swim. Goldens are prone to ear infections, and ear infections are no fun. It's also expensive being treated for them. Have your people get rid of any water in your ears, and it might get rid of the chance of an ear infection.

As I said earlier, I avoid swimming. While you're splashing around in the pool, the lakes and the rivers, I'll be playing with my brothers and sisters indoors, and chasing birds and squirrels in the backyard. Have fun, stay safe and enjoy yourself.

Hi,

I hope you had a great 4th of July, and your furry friends did not get too stressed. (Fireworks--and all the other noisy things that happen during that holiday can really make dogs anxious.)

What an unusual year 2020 is for us all, right? We had to cancel our two largest fundraisers—our 6K run and our trivia night. We want to thank everyone who so generously donated to our Valentine Appeal, Give STL Day, along with the appeal to help pay for Dixie's surgery. Dixie recovered from both surgeries and is now in her forever home. In regards to the recent request to help bring 99 dogs from China, as of this writing, the goal amount has almost been achieved—a testament to how golden rescues work together. A number of rescues are collaborating in this monumental rescue. Love a Golden Rescue will be taking two dogs: Kevin and Yana.

This winter, we had a lot of puppies. LAGR owes a big thank you to those who stepped right up to foster at the initial intake. Once they have had their second shots, we place the puppies in foster-to-adopt homes and—with the foster- and-soon-to-be-forever families—Love a Golden Rescue co-owns the puppies until they are spayed or neutered. At that time, the adoption contract is completed. From my experience of having raised Taters' Tots 6 years ago (a litter of 11 precocious puppies), it is a lot of work. You have to keep your wits about you, but it's also very rewarding. I look at Tater each day (we adopted her) and wonder how she gave birth to and raised all those puppies. She was a wonderful mother. Even now, she doesn't want to leave her safe place. No walks for Tater, no crossing the kitchen floor. She left her life at a breeder's, found a forever home, and now she is the happiest girl and is showered with love. Seeing a dog flourish, a dog that lived not such a great previous life... that makes rescue work worth it.

Please stay safe and healthy. Your families—including your four-legged family members—depend on you.

Lacey's Story

Upon bringing Lacey home, she and our older golden retriever, Daisy, had a sweet connection, Daisy knew Lacey needed extra love and care, and she was teaching Lacey how to be a dog. However, only 3 short weeks after we brought Lacey home, we suddenly lost our sweet Daisy on January 23, and we watched Lacey spiral downhill immediately. It was terrible and devastating to us to see how traumatized Lacey was. They had only been together for 3 weeks, but Lacey was learning so much from Daisy.

I was desperate to help Lacey. Upon talking with Jan, Barb (Lacey's dear sweet wonderful foster mom) and our vet, we knew we needed to get another dog for Lacey. As a breeder dog, other dogs were her companions all of those years. She needed that, because she did not trust us at all.

On February 23, we adopted another rescue from Tulsa. She is a border collie/Lab mix and her name is "Aggie." Aggie had also had a very difficult life of abuse and abandonment, but Lacey and Aggie seemed to connect very quickly upon meeting. The minute we brought Lacey and Aggie home that day, Lacey was a different dog. Up until the day we adopted Aggie, Lacey was afraid to go outside and afraid to come inside. She would jump at every little noise, bark and run away from every person. She would pace all over the house and would not come near us. She was terrified and destructive. The day we brought Aggie home, Lacey held her head high, stopped running away from us and would come to us. She now has confidence that is growing more and more every day.



We continue to work with her every single day and show her consistency, love and companionship. She can still get scared and gets stressed when there is a lot of noise or a lot of chaos. She is learning to walk on a leash and is doing better every single day and is understanding the word "walk" and will come over and lie down for us to put her harness on. With the current pandemic, our entire family is home, and it has given both Lacey and Aggie more opportunities to get to know each other and us better. They have been wonderful therapy dogs for us during this difficult time. Lacey loves to run laps in the back yard and play chase with Aggie. She follows her mom and dad around the house, loves cheese and apple slices and likes to steal her mom and dad's shoes and take them to other parts of the house (she has only chewed up one shoe--the rest of the time she just gets the shoe and drops it somewhere to be found by mom or dad later on.) She is learning how awesome walks can be too. We are starting to work on teaching both Lacey and Aggie other things such as "sit." Lacey celebrated her 6th birthday on March 22 with a few extra pieces of cheese and a couple of bites of ice cream. We love her and celebrate the small steps she takes each day. She is a beautiful girl with a gorgeous smile and eyes that will melt your heart.
